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Message from AHIN's Program Director

Hello AHIN participants and partners,

I hope you all had good summers, with time away from work to enjoy family, friends and activities on the land.

After the summer break, we are excited to get back into the work we are doing with At Home in the North. At the same time, it's been a very long haul so far with the pandemic, and the fourth wave has already had a significant impact on many of our partner communities. The role that chronic housing need continues to play in exacerbating the spread and severity of Covid-19 in northern communities is clear, and as a Partnership we have a tremendous responsibility to ensure that the connections between health and housing in the North are not ignored. Through research and outreach, we have dedicated efforts to underlining these connections, but in the coming months we will be looking to do more in terms of collaborative research and advocacy.

The fourth wave of the pandemic also means that we are still not in the position we would like to be in terms of opportunities for travel and face-to-face activities. With this in mind, and after the success of the webinar series thus far, we will be continuing with our online knowledge exchange program in this academic year, with a series of webinars already planned or in development for 2021-2022. We are also planning a mini-series of online workshops aimed at facilitating cross-Partnership collaboration and synthesis across the Research Directions. Stay tuned for details on these workshops in the next few months.

Finally, we will be launching a Visual Storytelling initiative as part of the knowledge gathering activities within At Home in the North, the aim of which is to gather the experiences and perspectives of northern community members on housing in their communities using accessible and familiar visual tools. Please stay tuned for more on that project as well.

As we settle into the fall, the Research Directions will be meeting again to plan their activities for the coming academic year. I am excited to see how we can bridge the work taking place in each of the Research Directions to develop collaborative tools for priority areas like community-led housing needs assessments, homelessness enumeration strategies that encompass the northern context, and understanding the unique housing spectrum in the North.

Thank you for reading, and I look forward to our continued work together in 2021-2022!

Research Direction updates

RD1: Supportive housing, programs and services

The Supportive Housing Programs and Services Research Direction is actively at work on a number of projects. These projects include: the inventory of supportive housing programs and services, case studies of innovative supportive housing programs in the North, and investigating the impact of COVID – 19 on supportive housing programs. Our work continues to be aligned closely with other partners in the Canadian Housing Research Network, and we continue to work closely with Community Housing Canada to share learnings on the supportive and community housing sectors. Finally, we were sad to see postdoctoral fellow, Dr. Travis Hay, leave the team and congratulate him on the next steps in his career. We were delighted to welcome Masters of Health Sciences student Ashley Wilkinson as coordinator for our team and look forward to working with her over the next many months.

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RD2: Governance, self-determination and policy

The Governance, Self-Determination and Policy group is developing a survey that will produce an inventory of community-led housing approaches from across northern Canada, Alaska and Greenland. The survey tool has been drafted and possible considerations regarding the implementation and roll-out of the survey are currently under discussion. The inventory will highlight opportunities and barriers of access to community-led housing initiatives, as well as specific groups within northern communities who are underserved by current community-led housing models. We will also be contributing to knowledge integration and synthesis projects that draw together expertise from all of the At Home in the North research directions, beginning with a review of Housing Needs Assessment tools and indicators. This project will build on past efforts by AHIN partners, and others, and will aim to design a tool that can be shared and adapted for use within northern regions and northern communities across Canada.

RD3: Housing, community design and the built environment

The Housing, Community Design and the Built Environment group is moving forward with developing case studies to identify and inventory contextually-relevant, and innovative northern community design and housing construction projects. We have finalized the case study template, and are now beginning to collect data on what is being built in Canada's North. Case studies are being developed through a search of publicly available information and interviews with local housing professionals as identified through the project partners network. Preliminary areas of focus are the Territories, Northern Ontario and Northern British Columbia. Housing professionals are being engaged to share their experience with construction projects, and to learn about local housing design, its contextual relevance and any adaptations that have been made. Case studies will examine not only the design of final projects, but the processes, programs and funding which lead to their completion. Learnings from case studies will be disseminated through the project network to support better design practice and policy change for Canada's northern housing.

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RD4: Health synthesis stream

Over the past year, the Health Synthesis Stream has used data collected by the CIHR-funded knowledge synthesis on housing and health, to complete a regional analysis of outcomes from Northern Canada, Alaska and Greenland. We have also begun a comparative analysis of housing programs for Indigenous elders, and plan to contribute to future knowledge synthesis and integration projects spanning all four AHIN research directions, including a review of Housing Needs Assessment tools and indicators.

Online knowledge exchange

At Home in the North benefits from a large network of talented community-based organizations, service providers, and researchers. In Fall 2021 we began two new projects to facilitate the exchange of expertise across this network and to ensure that our work is progressing housing agendas most important to northern communities.

Our webinar series began as an effort to maintain a consistent flow of communication about research and community needs across AHIN during the COVID-19 pandemic. It has continued to be a platform for Members to share project updates and generate important discussions about northern housing, pandemic responses, and research gaps. We have featured speakers from universities and organizations across Alaska, Canada, and Greenland to discuss their work, including several new projects funded by AHIN which look specifically at the impact of COVID-19 on northern housing and homelessness.

Another facet of our knowledge exchange has been monthly community profiles, published on the AHIN website (www.athomeinthenorth.org) and Twitter (@athomenorth). These profiles feature community partners within the AHIN network discussing the strengths, challenges, and opportunities for housing and homelessness in their respective regions and how their organizations are meeting those challenges with new and exciting projects. We have featured individuals and organizations from northern Manitoba, northern Ontario, Labrador, NWT, and Nunavut.

These projects have created opportunities to discuss exactly how AHIN can direct resources and energy toward answering questions most valuable to northern communities. Most recently, these engagements have led to an exciting new visual storytelling project which will feature multimedia stories about housing and homelessness across the North. It is currently in the early stages of planning, and more details will come when available.
